### THE NEXUS OF **BODY ART AND** GEOMETRY (THE ART!)

#### **ABSTRACT**:

Henna, is thought to be a blessing upon the skin in many cultures, such as Morocco and India. It is usually applied to the hands and feet, where the stain becomes the strongest. It is a playful and temporary art form that fades away in a week or two: a combination of making marks, drawing geometric shapes and symbols, and watching it magically turn colors from a green powder, to a brown top layer, to orange, to various shades of burgundy when the top layer is removed. Alchemy! Mixing the correct proportions is the first mathematical challenge: making henna paste; which is ground into a green powder for body art (and can be purchased pre-mixed and coned for a higher price). Then the powder is weighed and measured and mixed with water, lemon or tea, sugar, and a mordant: an essential oil that when added to the mix, creates a stain. It sits overnight (or about 8 hours) to cure for coning.

In this session, I will demonstrate the process of applying Henna and show participants how to roll and fill the henna cones, (coning) hold a tube to make marks and create designs freehand like circles, infinity symbols, triangles, squares—- the sky is the limit.


At the end of the session, participants may be able to practice putting small symbols on their skin so that they can teach the process to their Math Circle students.







### "I can't draw!"


- Art identity similar to math identity

- People might be surprised that they're actually learning something while doing these doodles





# Supplies for a henna Math Circle event

- Recipe (recommendation: Henna Caravan)
- Henna powder (recommendation: Jamila)
- Essential Oil (recommendation: Bulgarian Lavender, one of the safest mordants for sensitive skin)
- Non-metal bowl
- Saran mix
- Mixer (not metal) plastic spatula
- Water, Lemon juice (depending on recipe), sugar
- Floraphane/Cellophane and scotch tape (to make cones)
- Paper
- A clip (for cones bottom of it, like a toothpaste tube squeeze)
- Scissor (to cut end of tubes with different openings for making marks)
- Medical tape (for covering top coat of henna)
- Disposable gloves

Mathematical Challenge #1: Rolling the cone





Cellophane (or you can henna already preconed) .... Roll a 2-D triangle into a 3-D cone

Mathematical Challenge #2: mixing the correct proportions

Henna leaves are ground into a green powder for body art. Then the powder is weighed and measured and mixed with lemon or tea, sugar, and a mordant: an essential oil, that, when added to the mix, creates a stain. It then sits overnight to cure for coning.

### The Basic Equation

lawsone (henna leaf molecule)

- + acidity (tea/lemon) or water
- + terp or mordant (essential oils)
- + protein (keratin in hair/skin)
- = stain



#### **Essential oils**


Only use those that do not cause skin irritation, use aromatherapy grade essential oils – safest and most effective

I used tea tree oil for the mixes for the JMM demonstration.

Lavender oil is also great and safe, but test for allergies first by putting a small dot on the hand Some things should NEVER go in henna!


Never use gasolene, terpentine, kerosine to darken the stain – very toxic, black hair dye, black mehndi, and much more (www.hennapage.com) Introduce a simple recipe

Recipes we're trying today Tea as acid; no sugar Lemon as acid; with sugar BOTH: henna; lavender as mordant (aye releaser)



### Mixing the paste (color change!)





### Can mix with glove instead of spoon (very messy!)







...or buy it pre-mixed in a carrot bag and squeeze in into the cone

.... You can freeze it!

Filling the applicator (cellophane cones)






# Cut the tip (where you cut determines thickness of line)

### The whole trick to application:

Have your canvas – figure out how to put on the paste so that it looks nice

Hold the applicator
– so lines come out
nicely

### Practice on paper first...






THEN transition to squeezing paste onto skin with applicator

JMM PARTICIPANTS: can trade markers now, maybe try a second design



How will you hold the cone? Different people hold it different ways.





**ERGONOMICS**: how sit, how hold cone. Some use 2 hands to lean.



Smaller cone easier to work with than bigger one














Meant to be done in a warm climate




Raised henna (temporary!)



























One option: take your time

### **BLURRY** henna

Here's how it could look if it smudged, or if you knocked into someone. It's like putting chocolate sauce on your hand!



## Wait for it to dry!!!!!

Sealant: spraying lemon juice and sugar sealer on. The longer it stays on your skin the darker the dye




### medical tape



### STAIN or PLAY?

WHAT'S YOUR GOAL?

- STAIN (i.e. henna artist doing henna at a fair), then seal it
- **PLAY** (i.e. teaching), then sealant like lemon juice not relevant



# Applying henna to other surfaces

- Paper,
- fabric,
- Plaster cast,
- Mask,
- drum head....

# Pick/rub it off like a scab (over toilet or outside)

In the end you will take off the top layer and have a FLAT design.

# The color WILL change


















ADVANCED SKILLS, beyond Henna 101, glitter! (MUST BE SKIN-SAFE GLITTER)
